Spotlight on a Partner

Rev. Paul Kyalimpa – Pastor

...WITH A PASSION FOR PEOPLE

One of OA's key partners in East Africa is Paul Kyalimpa, pastor, agriculturalist, author and family man. Paul writes "I received Jesus as my personal Saviour and Lord in 1976. This was the beginning of an open door in my life into service." That open door led Paul initially into theological seminary in 1987 following which he had pastorates in Fort Portal, Kyenjojo and Kampala. Later he joined the staff of the Baptist Union of Uganda (BUU) as Assistant General Secretary.

In 1989 he married Christine and they have four children. Their eldest, Joy has recently graduated from Makere University, Josephine (17) is preparing to go to university, Joseph is 14 and Moses is 12.

...WITH A PASSION FOR ENVIRONMENTALLY SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE

Over the years Paul accumulated various qualifications in Uganda and Kenya, in Business and Religious Education. In 1998 he came to UK to Reading University where he completed a two year Post Graduate Diploma in Sustainable Agriculture and on his return to Uganda, alongside his BUU role and church work, he became involved in teaching sustainable agriculture to local farmers. His knowledge and skill base rapidly expanded and his passion for farming techniques to be sustainable without recourse to expensive fertilizers and pesticides has led to his becoming an expert in this whole area. In 2001 he did further training in Holland.

...WITH A PASSION FOR TRAINING OTHERS

Today Paul leads an incredibly full and busy life travelling extensively to conduct hands-on training courses for farmers at regular intervals both across several areas of Uganda as well as down into Tanzania. A similar pattern of training is used which involves a quarterly intensive few days of training to around ten farmers, (called Community Farmer Trainers or CFT's), who then return to their

areas to share their acquired knowledge and skills with folk from their home areas. At the same time Paul maintains his own farm in the western side of the country, experimenting with new techniques that can be added to his portfolio of teaching.

OA is providing around £12,000 this year, to support Paul's project activities in Uganda.

Responding to cries for help It's urgent!

“BREAKING NEWS!!! Last night a massive earthquake registering 8.5 on the Richter scale hit the sea area West of the Islands of Sumatra. The Pacific Tsunami Warning Centre has issued a warning to neighbouring nations and those affected by the 2004 Tsunami. The tremors have damaged buildings and left thousands of people homeless and many are feared dead. Urgent food relief and clean up teams are required...”

Tsunamis, Earthquakes, Typhoons, Floods, Droughts, Landslides and War inevitably generate massive public appeals. From sudden disasters to slow onset ones; from man-made to natural; the list is endless. Appeals for assistance and relief are on radio, TV and in direct mail with agencies known and unknown bombarding us we can be left feeling distinctly overwhelmed, fatigued and conscience struck by all the calls to be compassionate. It is easy to run dry and lapse into a state of helplessness instead of

being galvanised into action – compassion fatigue and giving fatigue are real!

ANOTHER VIEW

On the other hand, and in distinct contrast to this series of urgent and ‘loud’ needs,

there are many areas of suffering which are just as critical though not of the same magnitude. Individual families suffering famine

hardly ever make headline news. The few £’s that will keep a child in school for a year, or provide healthy sanitation, or safe

drinking water to a couple of families is lost in the hype of disaster giving.

David and the people gave very generously to the Lord's work acknowledging that all they had was from God. **1 Chron. 29:12-14** *"Wealth and honor come from you; you are the ruler of all things. ... But who am I, and who are my people, that we should be able to give as generously as this? (v.14).*

How do we measure the value of one need over the other? Should we measure the magnitude of the disaster, the number of lives affected or the volume of

"LORD, TEACH US TO GIVE"

An interesting variant on "Lord, teach us to pray."

Begin by determining your areas of interest. Ask yourself what is it that captures your imagination? What is it that makes your heart (and God's) reach out as you hear of desperate plights? Is it children? Is it sectors related to your own work – trade, IT, education, services, or community?

Then decide on the ministries you can trust. The most natural is to link with the ministry already sponsored by your church.

contributions to calculate value? In the West much of our giving and thinking is sadly influenced by the 'instant', quick impact commercial model in a way that makes long term sustainable community work unattractive to our giving.

What could be achieved with a gift of £10? Within Operation Agri it could enable a family to set up a kitchen garden in Sri Lanka. £15 would provide a water tap in Nepal. £20 would help towards a training session for a farmer in Uganda or India. Operation Agri is supporting these activities and many more as we seek to make a difference in the lives of the poor and powerless in our world.

Research by the Department for International Development (DfID) concluded that often faith based agencies produce greater value for money and that their work is more credible.

Finally, decide how much you should give.

It is easy to think that our 'mite' will make no difference but working in a context where change is incremental means the funds are also needed incrementally. As a result the big donors are not interested in our small initiatives but, in

the words of an old song, "It's a drop in the bucket, I can hear you say, but the bucket gets wetter and I know we'll fill it someday!" Drop by drop!

Consistent giving goes further and is far more effective in sustainable transformation than erratic, knee jerk one-off gifts that peter out as media attention turns elsewhere.

Commit to give and set up a standing order or faithfully put pennies in a pot. A committed sum per month or quarter helps partners on the ground plan ahead and focus on the work at hand rather than having to expend energy and time chasing funds to sustain a ministry.

LET'S TALK ABOUT IT AS WELL

Preachers who talk about money are often accused of talking **only** about money.

Oddly, we will believe what the Bible says about Jesus, salvation, heaven, etc. but don't believe what it tells us about money and giving. There are about 2,300 references to money and possessions in the Bible and about 500 references to prayer (a vital part of our work). If sermons were preached in that proportion a Sunday sermon on prayer would be followed by at least four more on money and possessions!

How many lives would be changed if our giving was in that proportion?

Our budget for support of projects overseas this year is £127,000. With your help we could do so much more.

News in Brief

“Sharing food is sharing life”



The promotion of home gardening has long been a part of Farms Lanka's activities, with the aim of eradicating malnutrition in the family taking the principle of FAITH: “Food Always In The Home.” It is Farms intention to see that the needy people with whom they work in Sri Lanka have access to good food through a sustainable family farming system and that such food is, first and foremost, available for the benefit of the family. Vegetable seeds are prepared, sorted

and packed in the farm centre and then distributed during the year for the families engaged in home gardening, with five kinds of vegetable seeds included in each pack.

Unfortunately, due to lack of funding, the number of families that can be supported in this way is very limited. Farms Lanka conclude: “It is the prayer of us all that the situation will improve very soon so that this valuable work can continue and expand.”

Self-Help brings sense of belonging in Uganda

“My name is Hanifa Nadumbe, I am 52 years and married with six children. Before I came to Beersheba I was in a terrible state. I lived an isolated life and did not experience joy at all. I was in financial trouble and could hardly afford basic family necessities. Every time I would get money I always spent it on food. I did not know how to put aside some money

in savings in order to educate my children and buy necessities for the home.

“This all changed when I came to Beersheba

and joined Self-Help Group. In this group I have been able to save money and can ably support my children at school. I have acquired knowledge about things such as parenting skills, improved farming methods, mushroom planting, Business skills etc. I am very grateful to God for Beersheba because I now have a sense of belonging, Group members

are my friends, and I am doing business and as well making a positive contribution in the community through tree planting.”

Hanifa Nadumbe is now chairperson of Subila Group (HOPE Self Help Group), and Operation Agri is assisting with the support of the Oasis led activities at Beersheba, in the east of Uganda.

This time we're looking at Tanzania and fund-raising ... to buy a cow!

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR A YOUNG PERSON IN A CITY IN TANZANIA?

My dad wakes me up. I head to the bathroom to take a cold bath. Since there is no tap water in our home, I use a bucket. My family and I live in a rented room in an eight-room house. A different family lives in each room. I walk with my 7-year-old brother, Zuberi, to a nearby bus stop. A couple of men who work for the bus company are at the stop. They try to chase us away and stop us from boarding the bus because we pay less money. Each weekday, except Friday, I attend school. I return home and wash my uniform. Sometimes, I help Mom chop vegetables. For dinner, we usually eat rice with either beef or bean stew. After dinner, I do my homework. Nobody helps me with it. I go to sleep in the bed I share with Zuberi.

HOW CAN YOU SUPPORT OPERATION AGRI'S WORK IN TANZANIA?

Why don't you or your youth group:

- Make Sunday Banana Sundaes (bananas, ice cream, chocolate sauce) to sell after church.
- Hold a coffee morning or tea party with Tanzania refreshments:
- Serve Fairtrade coffee such as Cafe Direct K'ilimanjaro ground coffee which comes from Tanzania.
- Have dishes of popcorn and peanuts as snacks.
- Arrange plates of sliced pineapple, banana, papaya, water melon, and forks for people to help themselves.

Borivali

one year on

While many parts of India are experiencing huge economic growth, development and improvement in facilities and services, huge wealth differentials still exist and support is urgently needed for minority and vulnerable groups like those people surviving in the urban slums in Mumbai. On my return to India this year, I was eager to visit the Operation Agri sponsored project at Borivali to see the progress one year on.

FAMILIAR FACES AND NEW PLACES

I made the familiar journey across Mumbai by motorbike with Aaboo Varghese, National Director, Projects at Oasis India. When I greeted Rosie, Sonal and Shradda, the OASIS team who work with the residents of the Ganpat Patil Nagar slum, it was like meeting old friends. Rosie was busy teaching her class of 3-4 year olds who were bounding with energy as they worked through letters and objects in their alphabet book.

Sonal, Shradda and I walked to a new centre in Lane 3 which currently houses tailoring classes for women on Mondays and Tuesdays. The teacher, Ramesh was busy training 3 local ladies in tailoring skills to make garments for personal use.

Classes will shift to a bigger centre in Lane 1 from the 1st of May. This is a multipurpose centre utilized for tailoring, counselling and outreach activities and awareness sessions for teenage girls, boys and auto rickshaw drivers.

INCREASING AWARENESS

One of the ongoing priority issues affecting residents is human trafficking, Oasis is building on prior awareness programmes in the local community and surrounding schools and have organised a rally and street play about the dangers of human trafficking for around 1,000 community members. The auto drivers also asked OASIS to run an awareness programme to find out what they could do and who they should approach, since they often have information about someone being trafficked and are a valuable tool in preventing trafficking.

One of last year's objectives was educating rickshaw drivers on the dangers of tobacco

and paan (betel leaf with tobacco). Sessions were conducted with auto drivers resulting in many reducing consumption of tobacco and paan. Teenage boys had a separate session and passed on information to their schools, friends and neighbours.

A COMMUNITY COMES TOGETHER

Sonal told me about several social events organised during the past year to bring the community together including a picnic on children's day and an annual sports day. The 2013 Christmas programme was a joyful event attended by around 300 residents. Following the event some women requested bible classes which were taking place every Monday between 3-5pm. One local church was also offering a bible school for 50 children starting after exams finish in April.

Ongoing life skills and awareness sessions are taking place once a month where information on topics like sanitation, skin disease, health care as well as general medical and dental care are discussed.

GAME ON!

One of last year's plans was to organise a football team for teenage boys. Though this had not worked out, as a result of networking and meetings Oasis had strengthened a partnership with the local YMCA. They offered the use of their sports ground and agreed to coach the teenagers for 2 hour sessions twice a week once their exams finished. I was thrilled to hear that girls were being encouraged to participate!

I was humbled by the commitment of the staff and the warmth of the Borivali residents. There is no doubt that Operation Agri donations and support have contributed to the positive changes in the community and bring them closer together and to God.

We give thanks for the encouraging improvements and the outreach work taking place in Borivali. Praise God for the dedication of staff and pray for guidance as the team search for two new staff members. We pray Oasis will be blessed in their search for bigger premises to continue their work in community empowerment, human trafficking, education, health and awareness programmes.

This year Operation Agri has provided £10,000 towards the work at Borivali. If this is to continue we need your support and that of your church.



Training technicians and farmers

This year's OA appeal resources feature two contrasting projects: hydroelectric power in Afghanistan, and farmer training in Tanzania.

In Afghanistan, it is not common to give away your knowledge for free! Knowledge is seen as an asset you must protect, but OA's partner in Afghanistan is keen to share its knowledge. RESAP (Renewable Energy Sources in Afghanistan Programme) is the brainchild of Christian engineers who came to Afghanistan to design turbines, generators, solar heaters and other equipment. Martin Beck leads the team of Afghan workers, who have gained experience of installing hydroelectric plants, powered by rivers in remote mountain villages, bringing light into each home.

RESAP has trained Afghan staff to construct the equipment, with several being given management training and help to set up independent engineering workshops. When a new hydroelectric plant is planned, RESAP now commissions these workshops to

construct the penstock pipes, turbines, canal sluice gates and other essentials.

Training in the village is also vital. For each hydroelectric plant, two local people are trained as village electricians. They set up the electric supply for each home, and also run the hydroelectric plant. The equipment is designed so that even if some parts stop working, it can still function. But the aim is to train the local electricians to do thorough checks and maintenance, so parts are repaired before there is total breakdown. They must look out for loose connections, or wires melting, or fan belts fraying.

One problem is that often the village electricians cannot read so must memorise the list of monthly checks, such as greasing the bearings, and ensuring the water grill is not blocked with leaves or plastic bags!

They also need to memorise a list of annual tests on the electrical circuits. Someone who can read in the village is given the list, to check it is done correctly!

But the main benefit is clean, clear light each evening, and opportunity to have a TV! They no longer need costly paraffin for lamps, so

they also save money, a double blessing. They are really grateful to RESAP and the way their team encouraged the whole community to work together to achieve all this.

In northern Tanzania, farmers gather 4 times a year to be trained as CFTs (Community Farmer Trainers) by OA's partner, Rev Paul Kyalimpa, who has successfully trained many farmers in Uganda. These CFTs then each train others in their local villages.

Farmer Boaz Kashubi has learnt a lot from Joshua Mpogazi, the CFT in his village.

Boaz used to harvest 6 sacks of beans, but now, using techniques of compost, mulching, and good quality seed, he harvests 21 sacks! Through a fund from OA he now has a cow, which has produced a calf. His farm now not only feeds his family, but he saves money in the village cooperative banking scheme. He has used

his savings to build a water tank fed by drainpipes from the tin roof of his house, to catch and store rainwater. It's a great help to have water available right by the house, even in the dry season.

The project is successfully reducing poverty, encouraging farmers to work hard, and is meeting the needs of local communities. Not only this, but through Paul's teaching about Godly ways to farm and care for the land, some farmers have been inspired to start church fellowships and Bible studies in their villages.

INDIA

Give thanks for the Borivali programme in this deprived

area of the city of Mumbai, funded by Operation Agri and now in its third year. Through OA's partner OASIS a new centre is now offering regular tailoring classes, counselling and outreach activities with teenage girls and boys as well as rickshaw drivers. At the request of a group of local women a regular Monday Bible Class has also been started.

Give thanks that a water harvesting reservoir in the village of Matiamahul in Orissa is now complete. Pray that

the community will value this resource and monitor and maintain the infrastructure. Pray for Mihir Sagar and the staff at West Utkal Agricultural Centre as they organise agricultural training programmes in other villages, and that increased productivity will result in families becoming more self-sufficient.



NEPAL

Continue to pray for the work of MCDS. The project at Triveni is

in its final year and the other supported work is coming to an end and new focus areas are being developed. Pray for Amrita Gurung, newly appointed as Executive Director. She and her colleagues have a vital role to play in helping deprived families in rural Nepal. Ask the Lord to give guidance in the planning and execution of the work, that it may be fully effective in changing lives both spiritually and physically.



HOME

This year's appeal resource pack features projects in Afghanistan

and Tanzania. Pray that this will be well received by churches, and will encourage people to pray for the workers, and give generously to Operation Agri to support these and other valuable projects.
